# **Building Matters**

## Falling masonry

Unfortunately, progress with arranging the repairs to the two areas of damaged masonry has been slow over the summer for various reasons, including holidays.

The DAC's stained glass specialist visited to look at the area round the stained glass window and is considering how best to protect the window while the work is done. This is particularly important, since the window is architecturally and historically significant.

Further examination of both areas at close quarters is needed and so the scaffolding will be erected soon to enable the contractors to clarify the situation. For both safety and security reasons, the bottom of the scaffolding will be boarded as it was for the north aisle windows. We hope to keep disruption to a minimum.

# Play area carpet.

A new carpet has been ordered for the children's play area and should be fitted on Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> October.

### Mitcham memorial plaque

The new memorial plaque for the Mitcham family, who have been significant benefactors to the church building, has been installed in the chancel. They donated the central section of the east window and the late Michael Mitcham, whose name has been added to the plaque, was a member and supporter of The Preservation Trust for many years. Some minor installation damage to the surrounding plasterwork will be made good when the builders are on site to deal with the problems in the aisle and window.

# This month's Eco Living Ideas from Kathy



Some easy actions which will save damaging the planet further, and also save you money:

- switch off lights when you leave a room
- switch off any outside lights you have – they disturb wildlife
- turn the tap off when brushing your teeth
- have a shorter shower (saves the energy used to process and to heat the water)
- save the water that runs from the hot tap while you're waiting for it to warm up, and use for other purposes

Other ideas which may cost a bit now, but will save you money in the longer term:

- Use draught excluders along the bottom of doors
- Grow climbers and trees around your house to help keep it cool in summer
- Use a motion sensor on outside lights

# Reflection

How can one describe a relationship? In my case I could describe my relationship with my wife of many years, Susan, as "we met in 1960, 63 years ago, married in 1967, 56 years ago, and I was parted from her in 2020, 3 years ago." All true, but very incomplete; there is no mention of our mutual reliance on each other or even of the love that bound us together. I am aware that probably most of you reading this will have been through some form of "parting" like the one I have described and will know from first-hand experience what it involves on an emotional level. One of the measures is the frequency of feeling "I wish you were here".

As the years pass (all so quickly yet seeming so slowly) I have found that this wish has become inverted. Realising that Susan has passed into the better care of our Heavenly Father, a much better place than anywhere on earth, I have come to appreciate that it is selfish to wish for her return here and instead I find I am increasingly looking forward to joining her there. In other words, instead of "I wish you were here" I now feel "I wish I was there".

How do these thoughts translate into our relationship with God? We have no comparable timeline for a start, unless you can put a date on when your belief in our Creator first arose. But what we do have is the knowledge that we rely on God and that He loves us. So we do have those aspects of relationships which are deeper than just a timeline of key events. We also know that God will not leave us, never be "parted" from us. Moreover, He is waiting for us to join Him when we have completed our allotted time on earth. This all adds up to making a perfect match; different from human relationships, but just as real. It also makes perfect sense of "I wish I was there" because "there" is where God is too.

God's second greatest Commandment is to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Extending this, it is logical that this requires us to love everybody. God loves us, unconditionally forgiving us through His unbounded Grace. This makes love the "glue" that holds everything together, connects all us humans to each other and to God, whilst also eliminating the difference between "I wish you were here" and "I wish I was there". When I married Susan 56 years ago we made a vow "'til death us do part". Well, I do not feel that death has parted us except in the physical sense and if we are not "parted" then what is the difference between "here" and "there"? Love still binds us.

I find this comforting. We do not need to understand how it works. Let us just take the Good News that God is with us, and that our loved ones, even those departed this earth, are also with us. In due course our time will come and God will gather us up and we will be together in a common, united manner, but in the meantime, we have to complete the tasks set out for us, even though we may not be clear about them either!

I write these words on the third anniversary of Susan's passing and I was going to apologise for raising the subject again. But instead I am going to say that I hope someone reading this will find comfort and encouragement in it, especially if they are going through a loss.

# Do the Bible and Science contradict each other?

For the Christian, the Bible is God's Word to us; it tells us about His character and creative purposes, how He has related to people in the past, and His promises for the future. Science is a specific way of studying the world, exploring the physical properties of things – a wonderful way to explore God's creation. So, the question to ask if the Bible and Science seem to be contradicting each other is, have we made a mistake in interpreting one or the other?

Science is very good at answering certain types of questions: 'What size is it?', 'How fast does it travel?', 'What is it made of?', and so on. Questions like 'What's it for?', 'What should I do with it?', and 'What's it worth?' can't be answered using scientific methods. Some of the misunderstanding in discussions of Science and Religion come from not recognising the limits of science.

It's also important to recognise what the Bible is, and what sorts of questions it can answer. The Bible was written well before people began to investigate the world in ways we would recognise as scientific. Of course, people in the Ancient Near East were studying the world around them, observing the movements of the stars, the processes of life and death that happened all around them, the seasons, the behaviour of physical objects, and so on. But they did not study the mechanisms underlying these things systematically using the tools of science, and they did not see or describe the world in scientific terms – not because they weren't intelligent, but because Science, as we know it, wasn't happening at that time.

Instead, the biblical writers used words that were commonly used in their own cultures to record events, share truth and wisdom, and tell stories that convey deep truth about God's character. If we want to understand God's intention in inspiring these words, we need to do some careful work to connect with those ancient writers and find out what they meant, before we can discover what those words mean to us today.

These principles can help us have far more fruitful conversations about Science and Christian faith. If we allow any apparent conflict between Science and the Bible to fuel our search for understanding, not only will we learn as individuals, but we will be able to draw others into a conversation that is relevant to wider society today.

# What's happened to live-streaming?

One of the positives to come out of the pandemic has been that we have extended our online presence, to include live-streaming services. Over the three years since the first lockdown, we have prepared sermons and services as videos on Facebook, then added Zoom services, then hybrid services, with a congregation in the church building, and others joining in via Zoom, then finally moving to live-streaming on Facebook.



We are still committed to providing this opportunity to join in worship with us, or to catch up later on, with the recorded video. You don't have to be on Facebook, as there is a link from our website. It's quite low-tech, run from a smartphone by just a few of us, so there may be weeks we can't offer this. Also, we don't live-stream Baptisms or Café Church services, because of the greater likelihood of children moving around the church into camera view, so that we preserve the privacy of families. If you can't get to church, or would like to find out more about church, and what we do, why not join us online!
