What are you doing for Advent?

The weeks leading up to Christmas can be very full, busy and noisy, which is why I find that deliberately entering into the spirit of the season of Advent can be a real sanity saver. I know that if I don't make space, it's all too easy to become caught up with the long lists of jobs to be done, and find that time for God has been squeezed out, and there is 'No room at this inn'.

Little things can help: for many years we have had an Advent candle, marked with the days of December, to burn a little each day, and have a few moments of quiet to watch the flames. I've often used a book of daily readings or reflections, and in recent years, that has often taken the form of an online resource, such as the ones produced by the Church of England. My photo-a-day challenge helps me to have some time each day to pause, look around and listen, and pray, and open myself up once again to the presence of God.

Advent can also prompt us to pray for our world. With so much that seems to be broken and in darkness, we can pray for the Light of Christ to come and for God to bring the healing and transforming power of his love and grace

For all of us, the journey of Advent ends, as it has always done, at the manger, where we face again the question, 'Is there any room?' May we be able to respond, 'O come to my heart, Lord Jesus, there is room in my heart for Thee', as we open our hearts to Jesus, and welcome him into our lives and into our world. Come, Lord Jesus, God with us, our Emmanuel.

Almighty God, as we prepare with joy to celebrate the gift of the Christ-child, embrace the earth with your glory and be for us a living hope in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL CHURCH OF ENGLAND

UPDATE ON LIVING IN LOVE & FAITH

The House of Bishops has recently made a series of key decisions on the future direction of the Church of England's Living in Love and Faith process, which explores questions of relationships, sexuality and marriage. Final decisions will be taken in December. At its residential meeting, the House reviewed detailed theological and legal advice on outstanding questions following the landmark 2023 Synod vote which led to the introduction of the Prayers of Love and Faith (or PLF). The PLF are a set of prayers, readings and liturgical material which, for the first time, enable same-sex couples to come to church for public prayers of dedication, thanksgiving and asking for God's blessing as part of a regular church service. Since then, the Church has been exploring whether special 'bespoke' services using the PLF could be introduced and whether clergy could legally enter into same-sex marriages.

There has also been much consideration of possible new arrangements for how the Church is organised including so-called 'Delegated Episcopal Ministry'. The bishops reviewed advice both from the Church of England's Legal Office and the Faith and Order Commission (all of which will be published in due course). While final decisions will be made by the House in December, the bishops agreed in principle that both bespoke services and clergy same-sex marriage would need formal synodical and legislative processes to be completed before they could be permitted. As a result, they also concluded there is currently no need for a new code of practice setting out special arrangements such as Delegated Episcopal Ministry.

Although there remains a wide range of views within the House on questions of sexuality and relationships, there was strong consensus on the need for unity, transparency and proper process alongside pastoral care. Despite personal convictions across traditions, the House of Bishops recognised these were the procedural realities to effect any future change.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, chair of the LLF Programme Board, commented: "As we continue prayerfully to navigate this important work on behalf of the Church, we believe these are the right decisions following further legal and theological advice. However, we recognise that for some, they will be difficult and disappointing. I continue to pray for God's grace and gentleness for all as we continue to discern a way through these questions."

ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY DESIGNATE, SARAH MULLALLY, SETS OUT HER HOPES FOR THE CHURCH

Shortly after the announcement of her nomination as the next Archbishop of Canterbury, Bishop Sarah Mullally delivered an address at Canterbury Cathedral, reflecting on her calling, the challenges facing the Church, and her hopes for its future.

Rooted in her early vocation as a nurse and shaped by her ministry in London, she spoke of "washing feet" as a guiding image of Christian service, and of finding hope in the quiet faithfulness of churches, chaplaincies, and communities across the Anglican Communion.

She addressed the Church's responsibility in safeguarding, the need to confront power dynamics, and the importance of standing against hatred and antisemitism. She said she would seek to be "a shepherd who enables everyone's ministry and vocation to flourish," and expressed her desire to nurture confidence in the Gospel. "Held fast by the Lord's hand," she concluded, "please pray for me as I will pray for you."

What's involved in... PCC membership?

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is the governing body of our parish and is responsible for supporting the vicar with the church's mission and wellbeing. Its key roles include: financial management; building and property maintenance including contents and churchyards; forms of worship and the appointment of a new incumbent; safeguarding compliance and adhering to our Policies and Procedures

Every member of the PCC is a charity trustee, and the PCC is the legal body responsible for complying with the Charity Commission regulations. PCC members are required to be on the Electoral Roll and once elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in April, serve a three year term. During the course of the year members attend 9 or 10 PCC meetings and the APCM. There is also the occasional Standing Committee during the year at which representatives of PCC address any urgent issues that cannot be left until the next scheduled PCC meeting. PCC members are required to carry out modules of safeguarding training.

I am serving my third term on PCC and from my own experience, recognise the importance and relevance of being able to serve in this way. I have gained a huge amount of knowledge over the years of the processes involved which has helped me to have a much broader understanding of how things develop and progress. It is a privilege to work alongside my fellow PCC members and build-up a relationship and understanding of each other.

Being a member of PCC is rewarding and it is an opportunity to contribute ideas and influence the mission and wellbeing of our parish as well as contributing own knowledge and expertise.

We are a friendly and welcoming group and meet together in the Guildhall, prayerfully and thoughtfully encouraging each other in our decision-making. We want to encourage new people to join PCC bringing fresh ideas as well as their individual gifts and experience.

Environment Matters

This month, we are re-cycling the Eco– Living ideas published by Kathy in December 2023, as they are entirely appropriate advice for the festive season!

(With thanks to Sue E and Good Energy for these ideas)

Christmas trees – if you use an artificial tree, use it for many, many years so as to reduce its carbon impact. If you use a real tree, dispose of it by cutting it up and composting it, rather than burning or adding it to landfill.

Wrapping presents – use re-usable cloth or bags, or choose recycled and recyclable paper and tie with ribbon, wool or string. Avoid plasticised or glittery paper and sticky tape which cannot be recycled. Save any wrapping cloths and paper, along with the ribbons, ready for next year. Any recyclable paper that can't be saved for re-use should be recycled (remove sticky tape first).

Packaging – clean/wash glass and aluminium and put in the recycling bin rather than adding to landfill. Avoid plastic packaging where you can (buy loose veg, refill bottles).

Food – Reduce the carbon footprint of your Christmas meals by eating more plant-based food (you could eat a smaller portion of meat, with a few more vegetables). Buy and cook only what you think will get eaten, and if there is any left, freeze it for later, or use in your next meal. Presents and clothes – look for secondhand items and try to buy what the person wants/needs rather than something they don't want. Support small and ethical businesses.

Enjoy being as creative as you can be in how you choose to celebrate the birth of Christ!
